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Notice of Psychologist's Policies and Practices to Protect the Privacy of Your Health Information

THIS NOTICE DESCRIBES HOW PSYCHOLOGICAL AND MEDICAL INFORMATION ABOUT YOU MAY BE USED AND DISCLOSED AND HOW YOU CAN GET ACCESS TO THIS INFORMATION. PLEASE REVIEW IT CAREFULLY.

I. Uses and Disclosures for Treatment, Payment, and Health Care Operations

We may use or disclose your protected health information (PHI), for treatment, payment, and health care operations purposes with your consent. To help clarify these terms, here are some definitions:

- "PHI" refers to information in your health record that could identify you.
- "Treatment, Payment, and Health Care Operations"
 - *Treatment* is when your psychologist provides, coordinates, or manages your health care and other services related to your health care. An example of treatment would be when your psychologist consults with another health care provider, such as your family physician or another psychologist.
 - *Payment* is when your psychologist is reimbursed for your healthcare. Examples of payment are when your psychologist discloses your PHI to your health insurer to obtain reimbursement for your health care or to determine eligibility or coverage.
 - *Health Care Operations* are activities that relate to the performance and operation of my practice. Examples of health care operations are quality assessment and improvement activities, business-related matters such as audits and administrative services, and case management and care coordination.
- "Use" applies only to activities within my [office, clinic, practice group, etc.] such as sharing, employing, applying, utilizing, examining, and analyzing information that identifies you.
- "Disclosure" applies to activities outside of my [office, clinic, practice group, etc.], such as releasing, transferring, or providing access to information about you to other parties.

II. Uses and Disclosures Requiring Authorization

Your psychologist may use or disclose PHI for purposes outside of treatment, payment, or health care operations when your appropriate authorization is obtained. An "authorization" is written permission above and beyond the general consent that permits only specific disclosures. In those instances when your psychologist is asked for information for purposes outside of treatment, payment or health care operations, your psychologist will obtain an authorization from you before releasing this information. Your psychologist will also need to obtain an authorization before releasing your Psychotherapy Notes. "Psychotherapy Notes" are notes your psychologist has made about the conversation you and your psychologist have during a private, group, joint, or family counseling session, which your psychologist has kept separate from the rest of your medical record. These notes are given a greater degree of protection than PHI.

You may revoke all such authorizations (of PHI or Psychotherapy Notes) at any time, provided each revocation is in writing. You may not revoke an authorization to the extent that (1) Your psychologist has relied on that authorization; or (2) if the authorization was obtained as a condition of obtaining insurance coverage, law provides the insurer the right to contest the claim under the policy.

III. Uses and Disclosures with Neither Consent nor Authorization

We may use or disclose PHI without your consent or authorization in the following circumstances:

- *Child Abuse* – If your psychologist has reason to suspect that a child has been injured as a result of physical, mental or emotional abuse or neglect or sexual abuse, your psychologist must report the matter to the appropriate authorities as required by law.
- *Adult and Domestic Abuse* – If your psychologist has reasonable cause to believe that an adult is being or has been abused, neglected or exploited or is in need of protective services, your psychologist must report this belief to the appropriate authorities as required by law.
- *Health Oversight Activities* – Your psychologist may disclose PHI to the Kansas Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board if necessary for a proceeding before the Board.
- *Judicial and Administrative Proceedings* – If you are involved in a court proceeding and a request is made for information about the professional services your psychologist provided you and/or the

records thereof, such information is privileged under state law, and your psychologist will not release information without the written authorization of you or your legally appointed representative or a court order. The privilege does not apply when you are being evaluated for a third party or where the evaluation is court ordered. You will be informed in advance if this is the case.

- *Serious Threat to Health or Safety* – If your psychologist believes that there is a substantial likelihood that you have threatened an identifiable person and that you are likely to act on that threat in the foreseeable future, your psychologist may disclose information in order to protect that individual. If your psychologist believes that you present an imminent risk of serious physical harm or death to yourself, your psychologist may disclose information in order to initiate hospitalization or to family members or others who might be able to protect you.
- *Worker's Compensation* – Your psychologist may disclose PHI as authorized by and to the extent necessary to comply with laws relating to worker's compensation or other similar programs, established by law, that provide benefits for work-related injuries or illness without regard to fault.

IV. Patient's Rights and Psychologist's Duties

Patient's Rights:

- *Right to Request Restrictions* – You have the right to request restrictions on certain uses and disclosures of protected health information. However, your psychologist is not required to agree to a restriction you request.
- *Right to Receive Confidential Communications by Alternative Means and at Alternative Locations* – You have the right to request and receive confidential communications of PHI by alternative means and at alternative locations. (For example, you may not want a family member to know that you are seeing me. On your request, your psychologist will send your bills to another address.)
- *Right to Inspect and Copy* – You have the right to inspect or obtain a copy (or both) of PHI in my mental health and billing records used to make decisions about you for as long as the PHI is maintained in the record. Your psychologist may deny your access to PHI under certain circumstances, but in some cases you may have this decision reviewed. On your request, your psychologist will discuss with you the details of the request and denial process.
- *Right to Amend* – You have the right to request an amendment of PHI for as long as the PHI is maintained in the record. Your psychologist may deny your request. On your request, your psychologist will discuss with you the details of the amendment process.
- *Right to an Accounting* – You generally have the right to receive an accounting of disclosures of PHI. On your request, your psychologist will discuss with you the details of the accounting process.
- *Right to a Paper Copy* – You have the right to obtain a paper copy of the notice from me upon request, even if you have agreed to receive the notice electronically.

Psychologist's Duties:

- Your psychologist is required by law to maintain the privacy of PHI and to provide you with a notice of my legal duties and privacy practices with respect to PHI.
- Your psychologist reserves the right to change the privacy policies and practices described in this notice. Unless your psychologist notifies you of such changes, however, your psychologist is required to abide by the terms currently in effect.
- If your psychologist revises policies and procedures, your psychologist will notify you in writing, if the changes directly affect you.

V. Questions and Complaints

If you have questions about this notice, disagree with a decision your psychologist makes about access to your records, or if you have other concerns about your privacy rights, you may contact your psychologist directly at (316) 616-0260.

If you believe that your privacy rights have been violated and wish to file a complaint with *me/my* office, you may send your written complaint to your psychologist at 727 N. Waco, Suite 320, Wichita KS 67203. You may also send a written complaint to the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Your psychologist can provide you with the appropriate address upon request.

You have specific rights under the Privacy Rule. Your psychologist will not retaliate against you for exercising your right to file a complaint.

VI. Effective Date, Restrictions, and Changes to Privacy Policy

This notice will go into effect on April 14, 2003

We reserve the right to change the terms of this notice and to make the new notice provisions effective for all PHI that your psychologist maintains. Your psychologist will provide you with a revised notice in writing.
